Identification, Assessment, and Mitigation of New and Emerging Global Threats

As Canadian companies venture overseas in ever increasing numbers, the complexity and evolving dynamics of the international marketplace raises new and sometimes surprising threats to operational continuity and success, corporate branding, infrastructure protection and the security and safety of personnel. Few foresaw the destabilizing forces of the Arab Spring and impact it would have on Canadian companies. Likewise the tsunami and subsequent nuclear event in Japan, or the impacts of rare earth mineral scarcity on geopolitical affairs and extraterritorial anti-corruption legislation. Highlighting evolving threats in their Global Risks 2012 report, the World Economic Forum said that "the constellation of risks arising from emerging technologies, financial interdependence, resource depletion and climate change exposes the weak and brittle nature of existing safe-guards - the policies, norms, regulations or institutions which serve as a protective system." How many corporations have taken this in to account in their strategic planning?
